Topic

Flooding has been a problem in certain areas in St. Louis for many years. On July 26 of this year St. Louis experienced a deluge of water from a series of thunderstorm that causes flooding in various area, maybe even your yard. Specifically 12.22 inches of rain fell resulting in a record for the most rain to fall in any single one day in the history of St. Louis. July 2022 was rated as the 2nd wettest month in the recorded history of St. Louis. Many homes were flooded beyond repair and Webster Groves, along with University City are currently making arrangements for buyouts for the homeowners.

Speaker

Our November speaker, Dr. Robert Criss, is a Professor Emeritus of Earth and Planetary Sciences at Washington University in St. Louis. He will explain why floods are a recurrent St. Louis phenomenon due to flash flooding of small suburban streams being remarkably sudden and dynamic. Resulting in flood damage that could be preventable. Robert has written numerous books and has published papers in over 50 scientific journals, several dozen of the papers were in reference to Missouri hydrogeology and floods. He is also co-editor of the book-*At the Confluence: Rivers, Floods and Water Quality in the St. Louis Region.*

In recognition of his study and work on floods, Dr. Criss was the recipient of the Lewis C. Green Environmental Service Award of the Great Rivers Environmental Law Center. Dr. Criss lives in University City and is currently working with the Gateway Green organization and the University City Council to on a solution to prevent the flooding and resulting damage in the city. We invite you to join us for this most interesting and important talk.

President's Corner – November 2022

Although we've had our first frost, there are still some nice, sunny days ahead. So hopefully it looks like cool nights and warm days are here for a while.

Here are several tips from the **Missouri Botanical Garden (MBG)** for November. They suggest you continue watering your evergreens until the ground freezes. Planting trees and shrubs is still possible. When you plant, don't forget to remove any wires, ropes and/or non-biodegradable materials

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s	rom the roots before you fill the hole with soil. Make sure to keep mulch several inches distant from the trunks when applying. A mulch application of 2-3 nches is suggested.
	f damaged by frost, remove the spent flowers and foliage of perennials. And lon't forget to plant tulips now.
fi	Mums will benefit from being cut back to several inches from the ground after lowering is done. A 2-3 inch layer of loose mulch can be placed after the ground freezes. Flower and bulb beds can also be mulched after the ground reezes to avert injury to plants caused by frost heaving.
p v b c g	The University of Minnesota Extension advises that you not clean up all the olant matter in your yard. They suggest leaving plants be as, in addition to winter interest, they can provide seeds for birds and stems for stem-nesting bees. Using fallen leaves as mulch for garden beds, trees and shrubs helps overwintering pollinators. Their report on creating habitat for stem-nesting bees gives more information:
