Gardener's Corner August 2023 (formerly President's Corner)

Despite the recent rain, the **Missouri Department of Natural Resources** notes that the State still has drought conditions. To help our gardens and lawns, the **University of Minnesota Extension** has a good article. There are several tips and tasks from the **Missouri Botanical Garden (MBG)** for August. Some of these include cutting back leggy annuals hard and fertilizing them to produce new blooms. As for perennials, remember to deadhead them throughout the season. Also, now is the last time to feed fall-booming perennials like mums and asters. In preparation for next year, you can divide oriental poppies, bearded iris, bleeding heart and bloodroot now. It is also time to order bulbs for fall planting.

If you are growing vegetables, beans, beets, spinach and turnip seeds can be planted now. **MGB** notes spinach may germinate better if seeds are refrigerated for one week before planting. It is also time to transplant broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower.
