**Speaker: Nicole Miller-Struttman** 

Topic: Shutterbee: Citizen Science in Your Neighborhood

Nicole Miller-Struttmann is an expert in bees and climate change, working on a bee project at Webster University. She will share how our landscape features and land management decisions affect bee diversity and behavior.

Nicole Miller-Struttmann is the Laurance L. Browning Jr. endowed associate professor of Biology at Webster University. Her research centers on the ecology and evolution of species interactions and responses to climate change. Recent projects include bumble bee trait evolution in response to long-term climate change; development of non-invasive survey techniques for pollinators; and pollination and habitat specialization in rare and common plant species.

# **Gardener's Corner – February 2024** (aka Carol's corner)

What beautiful weather today after so many dreary cloudy, rainy, snowy days. It looks like this weather may last a few more days. While Spring may not be here for a while, these next few days may give us a chance to work outside.

The **Missouri Botanical Garden** has tips and tasks for us during February. Some of these include spraying trees and shrubs with dormant oil sprays if they have had problems with insects in the past. These pests may include aphids, scale and mites and other such insects. If you decided to use oils, make certain you follow instructions on labels.

You can prune summer flowering shrubs such as Hydrangea paniculata, Lagerstroenia indica, Hibiscus syriacus and Buddleja davidii from the end of this month through early March. For other shrubs, however, wait until blooming is finished. These latter shrubs include Forsythia spp., Syringa spp., Viburnum spp., and Hydrangea macrophylla.

If you plan to grow larkspur, sweet peas, poppies and snapdragons, now is the time to sow seeds as they need to start their growth before warm weather. Cold weather vegetables can be started indoors for transplantation outside in March and April. Broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, celery kohlrabi, kale, collards, mustard greens and bok choy are on that early start list.

This thorough publication, *Starting Plants from Seeds Indoors*, from the **University of Missouri Extension** should help get you underway if you are interested in starting cold weather crops.
